Working With Families Bereaved By Murder & Manslaughter

About The Course

A one day training workshop, to develop greater knowledge and understanding of the effects of traumatic bereavement.

Losing a loved one to murder or manslaughter is unlike the grief process many of us experience throughout our lives. The trauma that is associated with murder can make day to day life management, communicating, corresponding, and understanding, impossible for quite some time.

Working with families affected by traumatic death can be difficult, but should also be highly rewarding. We have worked with families affected by violent crime since 1993, and in that time have developed a wealth of knowledge on victims needs and behaviour. Understanding these needs will ensure that the work you do with families will be highly effective.

Understanding Traumatic Bereavement

The course has been designed to develop the skills of professionals enabling them to:

- Understand and recognize the variety of reactions an individual has in relation to trauma, including physical, emotional and mental.
- Understand the impact an act of violence can have on familial relationships, and how to enhance care and support offered to all.
- Increase confidence and sensitivity when delivering bad news to a family.
- Identify effective intervention strategies, specifically in areas of alcohol and substance abuse as a way of coping with trauma.
- Better understand different beliefs and cultures and the important role this has for those who have been bereaved by violent crime
- Examine personal self awareness in relation to trauma and explore ways of self preservation and support.
